Providing Expedited Transition Services to OOS Youth







Built a 45-day plan

- Met with CDSS regarding possible ways to ease the transition of youth and ensure individualized assessment
- Discussed options for how to effectively support the rapid transition of youth
- Alliance member agencies offered
 Expedited Transition Services to 60 total
 youth (probation and child welfare) from
 16 counties







Expedited Transition Services

- Wraparound providers
- Worked closely with county placing workers and behavioral health departments
- Weekly meetings with state departments
- Weekly TA calls
- Individualized assessments
- Engaged family members


- Developed individualized plans specific to youth needs
- Worked with Catalyst
 Center to identify potential placements
- Created vacancy report that provided up to date information on vacancies
- Developed a mechanism for invoicing in the event that county could not develop contract immediately





Systems Gaps

- Communication of review process for Out of State Youth
- Use of individualized approach to identifying youth's placement needs
- Lack of information on potential programs statewide
- Need for local interagency work
- Regulatory issues (secure perimeters, delayed egress) in CA limit facilities ability to manage crisis situations







Identified Service Gaps

- Youth requiring distance from traffickers
- Process of looking at all potential options for a young person and individualizing care
- Crisis Services consistently available
- High End Services (above STRTP) for youth with complex needs
- Lack of support for STRTPs that could assist in taking youth with more complex needs



- ✓ Use of AB2944 approaches
- ✓ Statewide approach is key
- ✓ Build on TA process
- Ensure that family members, youth are engaged
- ✓ Collaboration is essential








Vacancy Report

- Began collecting facility-specific vacancy data the week of 12/20/2020.
- Vacancy data from 188 Providers encompassing 364 facilities around CA.
- Participating facilities have a combined 10,177 bed capacity.
- Data includes 45 counties (78% of CA).
- Average of 71 facilities submitting updated vacancy information each week.
- Vacancy report identifies Probation and Child Welfare contracts.

Current Activities



Maintain weekly provider vacancy report in order to identify potential placements in STRTPs, THPs and FFAs for youth in need of placements.



Ongoing outreach to providers to ensure that information on their services is accurate and to assist with appropriate "matching" between youth and placements.



Participation in TA calls for out of state youth and development of specialized programming as needed.



Respond to inquiries from county officials on placement options.


- Reach out to providers/assist with matching by bridging connections with counties and providers.
- Facilitate weekly meetings with providers and state officials to develop individualized programming for complex care youth.
- Individual emails, calls and Zoom introduction meetings with providers and county placement officials.
- Coordinate statewide "Meet and Greets" between providers and county placement officials.






Referral Demographics (includes Probation and Child Welfare)







Level of risk to others

Addressing Gaps in the Continuum

STRTPs Serving Higher Acuity Youth

- Minimum set of mental health services
- Changes to staff educational requirements
- Changes to STRTP rate structure

Limited Alternatives

- Crisis ResidentialServices (PRTF)
- Crisis ContinuumServices
- Specialized Programs
 that allow capacity for delayed egress







Bills/Budget Items in Process to Address Gaps

- AB226 (Ramos) Creates a Psychiatric Residential Treatment Program Model for Crisis Residential
- AB 808 (Stone) Creates a pilot Crisis Continuum of Care
- AB 1283 (Stone) CCR Clean Up Bill; proposed language that addresses STRTP gaps
- \$42.1M (May Revise and Legislature's Budget) for Addressing Complex Care Needs of Youth (individualized services)
- \$100M (Legislature's Budget) for pilot Crisis Continuum of Care programs
